Winchester Youth Group (WUSYG) and Director of Youth Ministries Sam Wilson will lead this service on hope and possibility in a world seemingly filled with despair.
Bombarded with dark and heavy news, we often find ourselves pushing back on, and resisting, so much these days. But what are the good things that we are cultivating? What are the wins and how do we envision them continuing this next year? This service will ask us to find the seeds of good, and, seeing that so many have been planted this past year, imagine what we can grow together.

This Sunday, we share our gifts with the **Beyond Bond and Legal Defense Fund**, whose mission is to release detainees from the South Bay Immigration Detention Center in Boston, to provide for legal services and to support immigrant-led justice organizations. (Beyond Bond will be our Share the Plate recipient for all of January, as part of a campaign to raise \$5K. Community contributions will be matched, up to \$2K, by the Social Action and Outreach Committee, through their funds for grants.)

Flag Display Discussion in the Parlor at Noon This Sunday



Worship Debrief

On January 13th, WUS members and friends gathered after worship to discuss recent changes in our services. <u>Due to an unfortunate recycling incident, the notes from</u> <u>the meeting are lost.</u> However, some general conclusions include:

We want to include a brief time of all-community greeting but prefer that it happen very early in the service so it doesn't disrupt the flow of worship.



We have different opinions about asking first-time visitors to fill out an information card in lieu of a financial gift during the offering.

"Kindling of the Light" is appreciated and well-received.

Other ideas include: offering stones and a bowl of water in addition to candles to acknowledge personal joys and sorrows, providing an opportunity for people to write down joys and sorrows when they arrive for naming during the service, and having the greeters hand newcomers an information card before the service begins.

Drawing on this feedback, the worship team will continue testing different
