There are many great opportunities for singing at the Winchester Unitarian Society.


Adult Choir rehearses 8:45 am on Sunday mornings.


Grief, Loss and Transitions Group Meets Tonight, March 28th

The Ordination of Deb Morgan Bennett Saturday, April 6, at 4 p.m.



WUS Seeks Summer Minister/Administrator

With Administrator Alison Baron's departure in mid-June and Administrative Assistant Jenny Goh visiting family in July and August, the office is without administrative staff this summer. The Standing Committee will add some administrative responsibilities to the Summer Minister role this year. Due to a mandatory class, unfortunately Intern Minister Marianne DiBlasi is unable to serve as Summer Minister so we are seeking outside candidates. The Winchester Unitarian Society seeks a part-time Summer Minister/Administrator for July and August of 2019 for about 20 hours/week. Primary responsibilities are providing regular ministerial presence in Sunday services (leading two and participating in most others,) helping to coordinate service planning, responding to pastoral care needs along with our committed Pastoral Care Associates team and offering one informal program or community-building activity. Due to a temporary absence of administrative support this summer, the Summer Minister/Administrator will also open the Society office according to a posted and predictable schedule a few hours each weekday and respond to simple requests via phone, mail and email. When there are no office tasks to be done, the SM/A may complete their ministerial tasks while staffing the office.

Compensation is \$2,000/month or \$4,000 for the season with responsibilities beginning July 1 and ending August 31st. End a Million Pounds of CO2 Pollution Now

Growing CO2 pollution is causing Earth's warming, ever more extreme weather, rising seas, human suffering and even extinctions for many life forms. To slow and reverse this disaster, each of us must act. One easy and significant act is to switch from your electricity source which is typically 85% from carbon fuels to one that is 0%; that adds electricity to the grid that is 100% produced by wind, solar, or hydro. Your electric bill cost change will likely range from -1% to +15%. So far this church plus 18 WUS households have acted by each making one phone call to the phone number listed for your town with 100% renewable in the Symmes room. (Other CO2 reducing acts are also explained there.) We aim for the following headline by June 1,2019.

135 WUS Households Buy Green Electricity: Stop 500 Tons of CO2 Pollution
