The Culture of Gender

The Rev. Heather Janules Worship Associate: Peter McEntee

Britanny Packnett affirms that "Too often, the idea that marginalized people...should

not expect to be fully...included in the fabric of our communities is reinforced by each of us. By what we say. By what we don't say...By who we defend. By who we punish...By the changes we make room for and by the evolutions we deem 'too fast, too revolutionary, or too soon.'...By the pace we want to set for the freedom of others."

Although women and those with feminine gender expression make up a little less than half the world's human population, they have faced danger and discrimination in many cultures and across generations and thus are often marginalized. Some of these prejudices are woven into mainstream US culture itself, prejudices that harm people of all gender identities. This service will explore the role of gender in our communities and how we might move towards collective respect and dignity.

This Sunday, we share our gifts with **Planned Parenthood Massachusetts**, "protect[ing] and promot[ing] sexual and reproductive health and freedom of choice by providing clinical services, education and advocacy. [Their] vision is that sexual health is essential to every person's well-being."

Operations analysis

Last spring the congregation approved a budget for this year with a significant deficit, with the understanding that Standing Committee would undertake an analysis of staffing and other operations. Our goal is to determine what organizational structure will best help us to serve our mission within the constraints of our resources.

The task force has reviewed internal data and documents – notably job descriptions for all staff - and has interviewed Rev. Janules as chief of staff. The Rev. David Pyle, our coach from the UUA, has helped us identify three congregations whose staffing structures might be instructive. We are gathering information about them and will interview a member of staff or lay leader from each. We will also be interviewing members of our staff, who are subject matter experts on how work gets done here and how it might be done better.

Standing Committee Open Conversation:

Should we have a capital campaign?

At last year's annual meeting the congregation voted to withdraw \$60,000 from the Meyer Fund to provide the bulk of the funds to re-do our parking lot, front driveway and walkways to enhance safety, circulation and access. At the time other major projects were identified, and several people posed the question whether we should consider a capital campaign. Thanks to the generosity of our members, the most urgent needs – a lift outside the office, improvements to the sound system and work on the organ – have been funded. Are there other significant needs? What enhancements to our building would enable us to better serve our mission? Come to a discussion in the parlor after the service this Sunday to hear what the Building and Grounds Committee has on its list and add your thoughts.

Suggested donation \$20 with proceeds to benefit the International Institute of New England, a non-profit organization that has been welcoming and serving refugees and immigrants since 1918.


