# We Have a Summer Minister/Administrator!

On behalf of Dennis Brett, Chuck Khuen, Tyson Kamikawa and myself, I am delighted to announce that the Rev. Joanna Lubkin will be serving as our Summer Minister/Administrator in July and August.

I first met Joanna when she was the Intern Minister at the UU Society of Wellesley Hills and I was a (nervous) pre-candidate, about to lead worship for a community that included the WUS search committee! Joanna's



warmth and calm put me to ease right away. Since then, I have gotten to know her through collegial gatherings and her leadership in the Sanctuary Boston community. From my direct experience, by reputation and through her references, I know we are in EXCELLENT hands.

A brief summation of her background: The Rev. Joanna Lubkin is the Unitarian Universalist Chaplain at Wellesley College and is an affiliated community minister at

Arlington Street Church in Boston. Joanna served as the Summer Minister for Pastoral Care at the First Parish in Needham for the past three summers. After a Masters in Public Administration from Clark University, Joanna studied at Hebrew College Rabbinical School, before finishing her Masters of Divinity at Andover Newton Theological School. Joanna sings in the Arlington Street Church choir and at The Sanctuary Boston.

Here is a letter of introduction in her own words: "Dear WUS members and friends, I'm so delighted to be spending the summer with you! I'll be putting my administrative skills to use in the office four days a week, and will be joining you in worship most Sundays in July and August. When challenges or celebrations come along, I'll be available to offer pastoral care and spiritual support. It's an honor to be welcomed into your congregation and your lives this summer.

A bit about me: When I'm not in Ministry Mode, I love to sing, experiment with gluten-free baking, read good time travel novels, and cherish time with my 19-year-old black cat. As an animal person, I will always want to see photos of your pets --even better, when you're walking your dog [on Thursdays] this summer, bring them by the church office! ## **Social & Environmental Action**

Three members of the Racial Justice team attended a workshop on May 18 on "Mosaic Makers: Toward Vital Anti-Racist, Multicultural Ministries" in Northborough, MA. We look forward to sharing ideas with the congregation in the coming weeks.

Another way to get inspired is to join the "Speaking Justice" workshop led by our Youth director, Sam Wilson this Thursday at 7:00 pm.

Last Sunday we had a fine discussion of the *Citizen* by Claudia Rankine. Aba Taylor, former Executive Director of the Winchester Multicultural Network. We recommend this book as a way to imagine *What does American black living look like, feel like?* 

Add your voice to the call to oppose legislation in MA to keep prisons open. An amendment has been added to the **House Budget DOC 8900-0001**. It states that if a

prison is open in 2019, it must remain open in 2020.

**Action:** Call your Representative and tell them not to support this amendment. The House Budget process is complete and the Senate debate begins 5/20 - 5/23. With 243 inmates sentenced at Framingham and 581 at Concord, both prisons are underutilized.

#### 2. COALITION NEWS

Welcome to St Paul's Episcopal Church as the **10th covenanted congregation in our coalition!** While congregants from St Paul's have been volunteering with us since our guest arrived 16 months ago, it is so exciting that their Vestry voted unanimously to join us in this uplifting work!

And while we are at it, the members of the UU Church of Greater Lynn recently voted in favor of becoming a Level 1 sanctuary church. A full half of the membership was present for the vote, and they were 93% in favor! We want to congratulate them and their hard-working sanctuary team!!

3. JERICHO WALKS AT THE ICE OFFICE IN BURLINGTON TUESDAY MAY 21 at 1 PM

The Jericho Walk is a silent interfaith prayer and act of solidarity. The walk draws inspiration from the Battle of Jericho, in which the community marched around the city of Jericho seven times, causing the city walls to fall. The Jericho Walk of today is a silent, peaceful, and prayerful walk to bring down the walls of our unjust immigration system and is open to people of all or no faiths. Please bring signs calling for just treatment of those who are caught in our broken immigration system. Please refrain from signs explicitly endorsing or condemning any political candidate or official.

#### 4. REPORT FROM THE BORDER

In February, members of First Parish in Bedford – Sylvia Cowan and Raquel Bauman – traveled to the US/Mexico Border. They spent two weeks at various locations along the border as Spanish-speaking volunteers – working first at a detention center with asylum seekers, and at a bus station with immigrants released from detention. They were working with the non-profit organization RAICES (Refugee and Immigrant Center for Education and Legal Services, Inc.) under the UU-College of Social Justice program. They also spoke with migrants making the long journey at Piedras Negras, in Mexico.

They recently shared their stories and perspectives in a moving program at FP Bedford's Lyceum. Attendees were divided into small groups and each group was given one asylum seeker's story. They read it and then discussed it. Those in attendance got a sense of the real trauma of the life stories of these immigrants, as well as the heartache of the process they go through seeking asylum in the US.

Robert Legvold is Marshall D. Shulman Professor Emeritus in the Department of Political Science at Columbia University, where he specialized in the international relations of the post-Soviet states. He was Director of The Harriman Institute, Columbia University, from 1986 to 1992. Prior to coming to Columbia in 1984, he served for six years as Senior Fellow and Director of the Soviet Studies Project at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York. For most of the preceding decade, he was on the faculty of the Department of Political Science at Tufts University.
