A ceremony to

dedicate our renewed entryway and stair lift will immediately follow the service.

This Sunday, we will Share the Plate with **Caminamos Juntos**, a UU Fellowship of San Miguel de Allende ministry in partnership with the organization ABBA House, providing immediate basic needs (shelter, food, and clothing) and continuing support through counseling, mentoring, documentation and job referrals to Mexican nationals recently deported from the United States.




Racial Justice Shabbat Services Friday, October 25th

Fire Drill Recap

In the words of one member, "more than 100 years after our first fire, we had our first fire drill" last Sunday. In brief, it took only 9 minutes and 22 seconds from beginning to end. Congratulations to all and many thanks for your patience through the process!



Some initial lessons learned:

It was unclear where children older than toddlers go (Main Street vs. monument)

We have a spare wheelchair to assist someone in immediate need but many don't know where it is stored (by the umbrella rack at the Main Street entrance.)

Some could not hear the fire alarms.

Despite our many communications, some tried to remain in the building during the drill.

It was unclear that those with mobility challenges were welcome to linger by the Main Street door.

We had crosswalk assistants for those going to the monument but did not have people assigned for the return crossing.




The Power of Myth book group is forming

A book group is forming to discuss the ideas of

this Joseph Campbell series/book, one chapter per month, on the second Sunday, beginning November, 10th 12-1:00 PM. The Power of Myth, a series of six one hour interviews of Professor Joseph Campbell by Bill Moyers, remains one of the most popular series in the history of American Public Television. The series (and companion book) explore spirituality and myth in a profound way, seeing the uncanny similarities of many myths across many vastly different peoples, cultures, religions, continents, and centuries. If myths were Campbell taught us to constellations. Campbell told us that mythology is not a lie, mythology is poetry; not a literal truth but a metaphorical truth. Myths from different



cultures, peoples, and faith traditions are remarkably similar, speaking to the innate condition of the unchanging human psyche. 
