
Sunday Nov. 17: LexRAP Conversation in the Parlor




Bring Your Favorite Pen to Church

The Church of the Larger Fellowship needs our help. Can the World Reverse Global Warming and Prosper?

On Wednesday, Nov 20, from 7:30 to 9:00 pm a free Project <u>Drawdown</u> education event organized by five Winchester based nonprofits* will be held in the UU church at 478 Main St. Drawdown is the NYT bestseller non-fiction book that documents a wide range of proven solutions which together could reverse global warming. Like the book, the event will not dwell on massive human trauma and extinctions of creatures unable to migrate. Instead this event will introduce the findings of a huge team of scientists from around the world who looked at already existing potential longer term solutions. They found no silver bullet. But they did find silver buckshot!



Eighty green house gas reducing or sequestering solutions are already in use and proven to work. And if scaled up reasonably could, together, reverse global warming by 2070, well within the lifetime of today's school age children. Also surprisingly, almost all the solutions were found to produce far more economic benefits than costs.

After a 25 minute video, small groups will compare reactions and together look at the solutions grouped into eight categories: Transport, Women and Girls, Electricity Generation, Buildings and Cities, Land Use, Materials, and Food, plus"Coming Attractions (20 "solutions" which are promising but not proven.) A chance to meet representatives of the five sponsoring organizations* and light refreshments will be provided, also free.


