How War Teaches Forgiveness

This Sunday, in honor of Veterans Day, we will welcome guest speaker Pete Rogers into the pulpit. After 40 years of silence and shame, Pete publicly "came out" as a veteran of the Vietnam War 10 years ago. Since then he has been telling his story to high school students in central Massachusetts — as a speaker with the Veterans Education Project - and active in educating his community to better understand the emotional trauma wounds of veterans.

Pete Rogers was a career captain in the US Army and fluent in Vietnamese when he served in Vietnam in 1968. He led an intelligence collection unit with the 173rd


Airborne Brigade. He came back a dove. He is a member of the Unitarian Universalist Society of Amherst, Massachusetts.

The Power of Myth book group is forming

A book group is forming to discuss the ideas of this Joseph Campbell series/book, one chapter per month, on the second Sunday, beginning November, 10th 12-1:00 PM. The Power of Myth, a series of six one hour interviews of Professor Joseph Campbell by Bill Moyers, remains one of the most popular series in the history of American Public Television. The series (and companion book) explore spirituality and myth in a profound way, seeing the uncanny similarities of many myths across many vastly different peoples, cultures, religions, continents, and centuries. If myths were stars, Campbell taught us to see constellations. Campbell told us that mythology is



not a lie, mythology is poetry; not a literal truth but a metaphorical truth. Myths from different cultures, peoples, and faith traditions are remarkably similar, speaking to the innate condition of the unchanging human psyche. 
Fall Sanctuary Training at First Parish Bedford



As you may have heard in news reports and other updates, the Sheriff of Suffolk County recently announced he had ended the contract with ICE and the detainees have been moved. Unfortunately, they have been moved further from their support networks and often to worse conditions of detention. We are waiting to hear of any future actions to be taken on behalf of men and women detained by ICE in Massachusetts and of course we'll provide word of developments.

Immigration Justice Presentation on Sunday, 10 November at 11:15am

in Hadley Hall, Parish of the Epiphany, 70 Church Street, Winchester:

The Boston Immigration Justice Accompaniment Network, also known as BIJAN or the Beyond network, is an all-volunteer network of people trying to reduce the escalating harm of the immigration system as it affects folks in the greater Boston area. Our first speaker, Rose Gallogly, is an organizer with BIJAN/Beyond. She says, "We provide accompaniment to those who are being held in immigration jail in the area, and do a huge range of things to provide court support, money for bond and legal fees, and general solidarity before, during, and after folks are detained. I am a white ally and accomplice in this work and try to be in constant accountable relationship with those directly impacted by this harmful system. One of Beyond's core values is that 'we fight for one another as family because we are,' and that's really the whole thing." Our second speaker is a person directly affected by the immigration system who can describe the lived experience of immigrants today.
