



The Power of Myth book group is forming

A book group is forming to discuss the ideas of this Joseph Campbell series/book, one chapter per month, on the second Sunday, beginning November, 10th 12-1:00 PM. The Power of Myth, a series of six one hour interviews of Professor Joseph Campbell by Bill Moyers, remains one of the most popular series in the history of American Public Television. The series (and companion book) explore spirituality and myth in a profound way, seeing the uncanny similarities of many myths across many vastly different peoples, cultures, religions, continents, and centuries. If myths were stars, Campbell taught us to see the constellations. Campbell told us that mythology is not a lie, mythology is poetry; not a literal truth but



a metaphorical truth. Myths from different cultures, peoples, and faith traditions are remarkably similar, speaking to the innate condition of the unchanging human psyche. "What does Love call us to do?" This question was asked in regard to immigrant justice during the sermon on October 13, <u>"Welcoming the</u> <u>Stranger."</u> The congregation was invited to



broaden and deepen the many ways the Winchester Unitarian Society supports immigrants by beginning a relationship with the <u>Lexington Refugee Assistance</u> <u>Program (LexRAP)</u> whose mission is to provide a network of community support to refugee families who are living in our midst.

Several people from WUS have been supporting a young refugee family with limited resources who is living in the local area. The family recently became a LexRAP client and, at our request, provided us with a wish list. The immediate needs of the family are:
