

A new door lock has been installed on the rear door by the kitchen. Your current key will work, when the locks change your new key will work.


Instructional signage on how to use the keypad and how to request an access pin will be posted shortly. Touch up paint will be completed shortly.

They say home is a place where you feel like you belong; but what if home is a place you were forced to flee to escape war or being persecuted because of race, political views or religious beliefs? As a stranger in a strange land, how do you find the warmth of community and a place to belong?

Winchester Unitarian Society is hosting a community-wide event to create awareness of immigrant experiences and inspire hope-filled action through the power of stories

and music. Storytellers will share various perspectives of refugee and immigrant related experiences. Interwoven between the stories, Spanish folk music and immigrant justice songs will be performed.

Featured speaker, **Abdi Nor Iftin**, a refugee from Somalia who lived in Kenya before immigrating to the U.S., will share his story, as chronicled in his memoir, *Call Me American* and on NPR's, *This American Life*: "Abdi and the Golden Ticket."

Marianne Boswell: founder of Lexington Refugee Assistance Program (LexRAP) will share her family's refugee story and how LexRAP began.

Dr. Jawad Abo-Tabik: An Iraqi refugee, after years of displacement, finally finds a place to belong with the support of LexRAP.

Patty Cameron: will tell her story of being a Sanctuary volunteer.

Karen Hirschfeld: will share her vision of Winchester as a Safe Community.




