#### **Music Notes:**

Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (1875-1912) was born to an English mother and father from Sierra Leone in Crodyon, England. He had a brilliant career and was dubbed the "African Mahler" by some. His interest in African-American music led to his setting 24 *Negro Melodies. Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child* comes from this collection. I Langston Hughes (1901-67 published his poem *Harlem* in 1951 as part of his *Montage of a Dream Deferred*, a poem cycle about Harlem. This poem is powerfully resonant with our current situation: "What happens to a dream deferred? Does it dry up like a raisin in the sun? Or fester like a sore – And the run? Does it stink like rotten meat? Or crust and sugar over – like a syrupy sweet? Maybe it just sags like a heavy load. Or does it explode?" I am also revisiting a work by Margaret Bonds (1913-72) that we heard last December when the choir presented her *Ballad of the Brown King. Troubled Water* is a brilliant setting of the spiritual *Wade in the Water* which reminds us that "God's gonna trouble the water."

Good morning families and friends,

A note to adults. The first page is for you, so that you may have context for the service and contents of this packet. Following that there some suggestions for other things to do/try as a family over the week as well as today, then pages for meditative coloring and a couple of activities.

Today's Worship Service explores Heather's reflections on the Revolutionary Love conference she attended earlier this spring. Much has changed since then, and much is and will be asked of us. And then there is the challenge of finding the right words at the right time, in the right way to respond to our children as we encounter yet another national trauma and the distress flare of the demonstrations. I used this phrase last week "ways to engage the religious, spiritual, social and activist expressions of our faith" I was referring to worship and Religious Education in the home, and this week, I refer to activism and the spiritual practice of living our faith.

As a community in the days of a pandemic, it's hard to know what to do. Many are taking to the streets. Many are not. We can all bear witness, especially when we raise our children to understand how important it is to address the inequities in our society. My advice to everyone in this Sunday's first reflections is to look not only for the "helpers" but also for the "teachers". It is a time in which we can listen and learn. There are many resources for children, centering people of color, indigenous people and voices from the communities in which we all have a stake. Please reach out if you would like support and/or a curated collection of children's stories.

**Before This Morning's Worship:** You will need your chalice, other candles for kindling the light, these pages, blank paper things to color/draw with, folding paper, and the "ingredients" for the activity towel directions found at the end of these pages (If you wish)

Encourage your children to come closer to the screen for First Reflections and have some manipulatives and the materials attached for them to engage with during worship. If your children are very young, sensory play containers\* are a great preschool activity. Kids come in and out of worship, but even if they seem inattentive or bounce in and out of the room, they are picking up messages.\*Let

You may wish to use the settling in and chalice lighting rituals we use in Family Worship and Religious Education sessions. They may helpful as your family gets ready for our Zoom worship services or for any family worship you wish to create in your own sacred space. You can also begin to add your own rituals. Just lighting a candle and taking a moment of quiet. It can be a time to give space for things going on in the world, or in your home. In my home we pause before a lit candle to remember the many who have died from the Covid-19 illness and through police violence in the Black community. Your older kids can probably lead the familiar rituals from our time at WUS, since many of them have. These are linked below for reference.

Here are some things you and your family might try this week together. **Today, June 7<sup>th</sup>** June is national **Pride Month**. That means we celebrate all kinds of people and all kinds of love. The rainbow flag you see outside our congregation is a Pride symbol. What different ways can you make a rainbow to display? Paint an old sheet and fly a rainbow flag. Paint stones in rainbow colors and set them up in a garden? Hang a rainbow poster (that you draw) in a window? What else can you think of? (there are some Pride pages in this packet too!)

**Monday June 8<sup>th</sup>** Today is **Best Friend Day**. If you have a best friend (who can be a brother or sister or cousin too!) get together on Zoom, or call them, or send them a note or drawing. If you do not have a best friend, think about what kind of best friend you would like to have. Think about the people you know – could any of them be a best friend? Send them a note or give them a call.

**Tuesday June 9<sup>th</sup>** We are all spending a lot of time with our families. Sometimes we get impatient or cranky. With the rest of your family revisit or create your very own Family Covenant. 

**Thursday June 11**<sup>th</sup> Let us make life beautiful! How can you make your world a more beautiful place? Singing, making art, showing kindness to others?







#### **DIY Activity Towel**

You can make this simple DIY Activity Mat with an old towel and permanent marker! You can use it when camping, after a swim, in a park, or in your home.

#### Supplies:

Old Towel, (or Flat Bed Sheet, or Blanket). Permanent Marker. Ruler.

#### \*Optional – Iron-on Vinyl, Cutting Machine, and Heat Press or Iron, or Paint Pens.

You can make your towel into a playground – try making a small hopscotch path, a Tic Tac Toe board, and small parking area for toy cars.

Using the marker and your ruler, fold the towel in half, and begin to mark out equal sized squares for hopscotch. When you finish one half, flip your towel over and finish marking the other half of your hopscotch path. Using the "leftover" space on the towel, you can mark a tic tac toe grid, a parking lot for

toy cars, a dinosaur paddock, anything that you want. See how creative you can be! \*If you are using a cutting machine to cut Iron-onn Vinyl, cut each hopscotch square individually, and then press onto the mat.
