Many of these calendars come with a small piece of chocolate in each cavity. They teach us patience and savoring the sweetness of experience. Please find the drop off baskets in a new location - by the back door of the building near the parking lot. Access to this basket is unlocked.



Building Beloved Community, Book by Book!

The Racial Justice Planning Group is eager to share with you, every two weeks or so, a book that will help us grow further into the intentionally pro-active, radically inclusive, anti-racism congregation to which we have committed.

Sunday evening, November 29, the classic, long-standing **news program** "Sixty Minutes" featured a segment on a sunken shipwreck found two years ago at the



bottom of the Mobile River in Alabama. The ship, *Clotilda*, was the last known slave ship to have brought captured Africans to the United States in the year 1860. You can listen to generationally-held memories of those Africans from their descendants at <u>https://www.cbsnews.com/news/clotilda-slave-ship-alabama-60-minutes-2020-11-29/</u>

And, we have an even more direct connection through **our friend Dr. Harris Gibson.** Harris was born in the very town that freed slaves, from the *Clotilda*, had founded, and he attended high school there. All the schools had been built by the slaves, primary through high. His family knew Cudjo Lewis, the central person in *Barracoon*. Harris led a small group of Racial Justice Book Club participants in a discussion of *Barracoon* last year. You can imagine how enthralling and informative his personal experiences and observations are.

So, with these two extremely relevant, topical, and close connections with living history, we offer our first book *Barracoon*.

Here are parts of a GoodReads.com review:

"In 1927, Zora Neale Hurston went to Plateau, Alabama, just outside Mobile, to interview eighty-six-year-old Cudjo Lewis. Of the millions of men, women, and children transported from Africa to America as slaves, Cudjo was then the only person alive to tell the story of this integral part of the nation's history. Hurston was there to record Cudjo's firsthand account of the raid that led to his capture and bondage fifty years after the Atlantic slave trade was outlawed in the United States...Based on those interviews, featuring Cudjo's unique vernacular, and written from Hurston's perspective with the compassion and singular style that have made her one of the preeminent American authors of the twentieth-century, Barracoon masterfully illustrates the tragedy of slavery and of one life forever defined by it."

An Update from the Pandemic Planning Task Force

PPTF reconvened on 11/19 and will be meeting regularly to address specific questions and inquiries about use of WUS space /grounds, to update guidelines as needed and to stay abreast of the impact of the virus on congregational functioning. We will be including program staff in our meetings to support them in planning. We have conducted 2 polls since the beginning of this church year. Although there was a range of responses regarding comfort level in allowing more in-person activity at the church, in light of the recent increase in Covid-19 cases everywhere, we will not be changing the status of our response.

For the foreseeable future, we will continue in "Phase 3 – Vigilant" of our WUS Pathways to Reopening. This means we will continue to limit in-person gatherings to outdoors, or indoors following all guidelines for safety including number of people in the space. Please reach out to us at **pandemicplanningtf@winchesteruu.org** if you or your committee has any questions about in-person activity on church grounds. All requests to use the church grounds should go through our church administrator, Thomas Slack, and follow the Screening Questions and Sign-In protocol.

Thank you to Thomas for faithfully implementing the guidelines with both church and community use of the building and grounds. Thank you to all who have respectfully utilized these guidelines, allowing some much – needed in-person activity particularly for our youth! It is such vigilance that keeps our community healthy.

We have had one report of a member who tested positive, though no close contact occurred within our WUS community. Contact tracing was done using our protocol. The member successfully completed self-quarantine and reported negative test result post-quarantine. We are so thankful that only mild symptoms were experienced. Please continue to use our Guidelines and Sign-In sheet for any in-person gatherings so that we may continue effective screening and contact tracing.
