

"What can we do?" This past Sunday, many people expressed feelings of powerlessness around current events. Here are a couple of stories which feature people sharing stories of transformation through relationship: Megan Phelps-Roper, formerly of Westboro Baptist Church, talks about building relationships on social media that in time pulled her away from an extreme right-wing cult. Here, Ai-jen Poo, of the National Domestic Workers' Alliance, shares the challenges of organizing a group of women that nobody thought could possibly be unionized. Joys & Sorrows: In the summer, we have the practice of sharing joys and sorrows with our community out loud, by speaking them aloud to the group. It is a practice of community litany and also of uplift -- a way of seeing one another. We'll be opening up that practice again in our Sunday service, through mid-February. In the dead of winter, after weeks and a year of fear and heartbreak, let us take up the practice of hearing our neighbors' concerns and gladness, and speaking out our own. We know that there are many sorrows now, and we must speak them aloud — we also know that life is often a practice of excavating joy, so let's allow others to share in that light as well! This practice works in a large group when we are willing to be honest, and also concise. We welcome your voice, and let us be aware as a community of our use of the group's space. If you are often a voice that speaks up, consider stepping back and leaving space for others.

Solutions to the threat of rapid climate change: Can they be both fair and effective? John L Keller, PhD, CCM

Rapid global climate change is underway, and accelerating. To scientists, the cause is crystal clear: disruption of our planet's natural carbon cycle largely from the burning of fossil fuels. A transition to a global economic system based on net-zero carbon dioxide emissions must happen within the next several decades to avoid the collapse of the global economic and political order.

Dr. Keller will address key questions, including:

- What is the magnitude of the climate mitigation challenge?
- Can humanity mitigate the worst impacts of climate change?
- How much would transition to a net-zero economy cost for the US and globally?
- What is the link between energy availability and human development?

- What are the environmental justice implications of our current fossil-fuel based global energy industry?
- Can the fossil fueled global economic system be changed while ending extreme poverty?
- Can market-based solutions, such as a carbon tax, be effective and consistent with environmental justice?
- What is the nature of the political coalition challenging efforts to effectively address global climate change?
- What actions can you take personally to make a significant difference?

John Keller is a full-time volunteer with the nonprofit Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL). CCL advocates for a national revenue-neutral carbon fee by lobbying congress and building political will through public education. John's career in meteorology and climate applications began in the early 1970s.

It's that time again....

Every 5 to 10 years, WUS engages in a Brick Campaign in which engraved bricks, purchased by members of the congregation, are added to church walkways. This year, the retired Pastoral Care Associates are spearheading the initiative to add engraved bricks to the planned Celebration Walkways designed by WUS landscape designer Julie Khuen and made possible by the landscaping gift given so lovingly and generously by the Virnelli family in honor of Judy Virnelli. The new Bell Tower Terrace and Walkways to Mystic Valley Parkway and Main Street will be completed by Fall of

2021 when we will gather together once again to celebrate WUS and the community we share.

Through the engraved bricks, each of us may honor, celebrate and/or remember loved ones or special milestones in our personal or collective history. One 4" x 8" engraved brick can be purchased for \$100. Part of the cost of each brick will go towards laying the Walkways. Deadline for submitting a brick order is March 1st.



Building Beloved Community, Book by Book!

The Racial Justice Planning Group would like to periodically share with you some reading recommendations—books that will help us grow further into the intentionally proactive, radically inclusive, anti-racism congregation to which we have committed.

This week we call attention to *Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates. The book is only 162 pages and, according to the book jacket, "is a profound work that pivots from the biggest questions about American history and ideals to the most intimate concerns of a father for his

son..." Coates deals with the question: "What is it like to inhabit a black body and find a way to live within it? And how can we all honestly reckon with this fraught history and free ourselves from its burden?" There is also a film interpretation of the book that is creative and unusual. Read the book first to get the full impact!
