Music Notes

Both *Song of Peace* and *The Pendulum at Falcon's Lair* are offered in recognition of Indigenous People's Day. Arthur Farwell was the leader in a group of composers taking inspiration from the music of Native peoples. Published in 1906, the *Song of Peace* comes from *Impressions of the Wa-Wan Ceremony of the Omahas*. And we celebrate the jazz bassist and composer Oscar Pettiford (1922-1960) who was an important figure in bebop jazz. His mother was Choctaw and his father was half Cherokee and half African American.

This is Me was written for the 2017 P.T. Barnum biopic *The Greatest Showman*. A fight song for people who are not accepted by society, it is sung by the character Lettie Lutz after she and the rest of the circus troupe are excluded from a party by Barnum.

With so much going on in the world, this morning's anthem asks the question, "How Long? How long 'til this world is free from suffering? How long 'til the power of love will come."
