The enrapturing *Méditation* for the Kindling music is by the French composer and organist Louis Vierne (1870-1937) who was the organist at Notre-Dame in Paris from 1900 until his death. • The meditative anthem is both in English: *My Heart is a Holy Place* and Latin: *Cor meum est templum sacrum).* Patricia Van Ness (b. 1951) currently resides in Saco, ME. • *Desert Interlude,* from Nathaniel Dett's (1882-1943) collection of 8 Bible Vignettes, draws its inspiration from the scene in Genesis when Hagar and her son are sent into the Desert of Beersheba by Abraham. It is one of many times when biblical characters are provided for by God in the desert. • We close with the delightful *Meditation* by the great Brazilian composer Antonio Carlos Jobim (1927-1994).
