Maria Update



It has been a while since we have corresponded and we hope everyone is doing well! On behalf of the Sanctuary Committee. I wanted to give you a brief update on Maria, the immigrant who lived in Sanctuary at First Parish Bedford, supported bv that congregation and а

coalition of other houses-of-worship, including WUS. She received a stay of deportation and has since returned to the community.

Maria is keeping very busy, cooking for the family, caring for her mother Teofila and, for the last few months, working at a large office building for twenty hours a week. She has reported that she likes the work and has been amazed at how much English she has learned. She realizes that she is able to understand the conversations that are going on around her and her Spanishspeaking colleagues have asked her to translate for them!!

All three of her sons are working and Saul now has his driver's license. Isidro is doing well in Guatemala and expects to graduate from college this November. Teofila has had her share of medical concerns but is currently doing better.

To Maria's delight, several members of the Strategic Team, a member of the Sanctuary Committee and John Gibbons have visited with her at different times. The Strategic Team continues to meet with her weekly to help her as she pursues her legal case and to support her as issues arise. Her application for an extension on her stay of deportation was submitted to ICE in March, but there has been no word about it at this time.

Maria is due to have her license renewed and we wanted to bring your attention to Question 4 which will be on the ballot but was not included in the Information for Voters brochure that we all received in the mail. A driver's license is needed for Maria and other immigrants to get to work, do grocery and other shopping, and get to health and other appointments.

Please see the information below on MA Ballot Question #4 which asks voters to support allowing immigrants to obtain a driver's license regardless of their immigration status.

Information on Massachusetts Ballot Question #4:

Please share this information with family, friends, and fellow congregants.

Yes on Question 4 for Safer Roads:

This is a campaign to uphold the commonsense law known as the Work and Family Mobility Act, which allows qualified Mass. residents, regardless of immigration status, to apply for a standard driver's license if they provide necessary documents, pass the required driver's test, and meet all other requirements. Ensuring that all drivers in Massachusetts are tested, licensed and insured will lead to safer roads for all of us, which is why MA city police chiefs, a majority of sheriffs, and district attorneys from across the Commonwealth, including the Massachusetts Major Cities Chief of Police Association, support a Yes on 4 vote. This would also allow workers and families to safely make essential trips like dropping off kids at school and getting to work, medical appointments, and the grocery store.

To understand why diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) efforts can feel unfair, even when they are not, we must first understand **oppressive systems**, **intersectionality**, the difference between equality and equity, and the origins of **inequitable systems**, including how they manifest today. For many years members & friends of WUS have provided boxes of holiday foods for area families through the Council of Social Concern. Last year we contributed 73 dinners!

This year the need continues to be great and we hope to donate a large number of boxes again. We estimate the cost, including a \$20 gift card, to be around \$95-\$100 per box. (We are raising last year's estimate based on increases in food costs due to inflation.)

In addition, we have once again arranged for Winchester Stop and Shop to pack boxes for people who are unable to or prefer not to do the shopping themselves. If you choose the Stop and Shop option, the cost per basket is \$94.44 for the food and gift card.

If you are shopping yourself, we will send you a shopping list and provide the heavy-duty box you will need. Bring your completed box, with separate

gift card (not in the box), to **WUS on Sunday, November 20 from 8:30 – 10:30 or from 11:30 – 1:00.** Volunteers from our own **Social Action & Outreach Committee** will then deliver them to the Council on Tuesday, November 22nd.

Boxes can be picked up at the church on Sunday, November 13th.

Or if you are choosing the Stop and Shop option: 1) write a check made out to *Winchester Stop & Shop* for \$94.44 per box; 2) in the memo line add *"Thanksgiving Basket Program"*, 3) mail or deliver your check to the church


