#### Music Notes:

Perhaps there was never a time when there wasn't music that invoked the night, held the miracle of the stars, or perhaps soothed our fright. Today we witness that special refraction of the night through music.

The *Prelude: Night* is the opening piece from Nathaniel Dett's collection *In the Bottoms* (1913). It is a very satisfying iteration of the mystery of the night, with a pause for some dance and celebration. ♦ Our vocal soloists, Cheryl Medieros- Nancarrow, Kirsten Hart, Brendan Buckley, and Rob Woodin sing *Der Abend* by the great German composer Johannes Brahms (1864). ♦ The French composer Claude Debussy gives us his impression of the moonlight (Claire de Lune- 1905). The piece was inspired by a poem by Paul Verlaine. ♦ And we continue by the gorgeous *Stars*, setting a poem by Sara Teasdale (2011). Here, Latvian composer Ešenvalds invokes the stars through tuned wine glasses. Special thanks to Hannah McWhan and Caroline Bronski for their help with these. ♦ We continue with the classic jazz tune *Round Midnight* by Thelonius Monk, a perfect invocation of midnight if there ever was one (1943). ♦ And we conclude with one of Chopin's many *Nocturnes* (1841).
