Music Notes:

We are thrilled to present to you this celebration of Beethoven's music in recognition of his 253rd birthday. We had intended to present this program to you three years ago for his 250th birthday, but the world had other plans.

Beethoven was a child of the Enlightenment in many of the same ways that Unitarian-Universalism is. We share the same values of intellectual freedom and exploration, love of nature, varying degrees of skepticism around God, and a passion for music, art, and poetry.

The *Eligischer Gesang* was composed in 1814 in honor of the death of the philosopher and poet Johann Georg Jacobi. Written for string quartet and chorus, it sets a text from the poem "Bey der Kunde von Jacobi's Tod", written by Johann Haug. It will be sung in German - the English translation follows:

Life gently touched thee, And passed as softly.

Too holy to know pain! No eye could weep for this heavenly spirit, when homeward turning.

The Choral Fantasy was written in 1808 and is the precursor to Beethoven's ninth symphony. In fact, you will recognize a similarity between the two main themes – and it should be great fun to follow this work with the Ode to Joy theme that comprises Hymn #39. The Choral Fantasy is composed for piano, soloists, chorus, and orchestra. I have abridged the piano solo significantly for the purposes of this service. The text celebrates the power of music and art in our lives. It will be sung in German.

Of our life's harmonies,
and from a sense of beauty arise
Flowers which eternally bloom.

Peace and joy advance in perfect concord,
like the changing play of the waves.
All that was harsh and hostile,
has turned into sublime delight.

When music's enchantment reigns, speaking of the sacred word, Magnificence takes form,
The night and the tempest turns to light:
Outer peace and inner bliss
Reign o'er the fortunate ones.
All art in the spring's sun
Lets light flow from both.

Greatness, once it has pierced the heart,
Then blooms anew in all its beauty.
Once one's being has taken flight,
A choir of spirits resounds in response.
Accept then, you beautiful souls,
Joyously the gifts of high art.

When love and strength are united, Divine grace is bestowed upon Man.

We conclude with the Hallelujah from Beethoven's Oratorio *Christ* on the Mount of Olives. Completed in 1803 and revised in 1811, this work is known for its humanist portrayal of the Christ passion story. The Hallelujah – sung in English translation- is the final movement of this work. I give you two translations of the text, a more literal one and the one that the choir will sing.

Glorious worlds above us spire, Happy Seraphs sing your joys. Man, join in the holy choir, Hail the great Redeemer's praise.

Hallelujah unto God's almighty Son.
Praise the Lord, ye bright angelic choir,
In holy songs of joy.
Man, proclaim his grace and glory, Hallelujah!
