Music Notes:

We celebrate the music of Native American composers today. The Anthem is by Andrew Balfour, a Cree composer and conductor from Winnipeg, Manitoba. "Ambe Anishinaabeg, Biindigeg Anishinaabeg, Mino-bimaadiziwin omaa Ambe." Which translates as, "Come in, twolegged beings. Come in all people. There is good life here. Come in!" We also hear two works by the Navajo pianist and composer Connor Chee, known for combining his classical piano training with his Native American heritage. Chee writes that the Kindling Music, "was inspired by the traditional Diné (Navajo) concept of Hózhó, often translated as "balance and beauty, which permeates Diné life and culture, and reflects the state of harmony that binds all things together in the universe." The Navajo Vocable is inspired by traditional Navajo chants, but Chee's original melodies. ♦ Jazz pianist and composer Don Pullen's last recording Sacred Common Ground was his attempt to explore his Native American heritage (Cherokee). While reproducing that recording is beyond our scope, we close with Pullen's Ode to Life.
